## Jim Branson, Rest in Power!

Filmmaker, Anne Lewis [A Strike and an Uprising (in Texas), 2018] who has screened her work at the Esperanza informed us of the passing of her partner of Lewy Body Dementia in August, 2019. Jim Branson was born at the base of Blair Mountain, W. Virginia. Jim became a lifelong socialist fighter and trade unionist. An open member of the Georgia Communist League, the October League, the CP Marxist Leninist, and most recently DSA and the Freedom Road Socialist Organization (now Liberation Road)—he went to China as part of a workers' delegation in the 80s. Jim worked in slaughterhouses and steel mills; underground coal mines and as a grassroots, cultural, and union organizer in West Virginia, Kentucky, and Texas. Physically courageous and an organic intellectual, he committed body and mind to the Mead Paper Strike, the Brookside Miners Strike, the Massey Strike, the Pittston Coal Strike, the Southern Organizing Committee's work on environmental justice, the

campaign for single payer health care, the March to Save Blair Mountain, and union organizing drives in West Virginia, Kentucky, and Texas. Jim was last employed with the Texas State Employees Union (CWA Local 6186.) His friend, Thandabantu Iverson, noted that

he was "the kind of brother who'd be standing next to you facing a group of Klansmen on a dark southern road." And Salma Mirza said, "He taught me how to be a disabled and sick person in the movement. He was always on the right side of history." Jim believed that every person who resisted, who organized, who helped build a new and

better world was his sister and brother. He invites all who remember him to join the struggle especially now in these dark times. The Esperanza staff, board and Buena Gente send our condolences to his family and the wide network of activists with whom he worked.
