

Father Peter Hinde

With much sadness I'm letting you know that Father Peter Hinde was taken by the virus this morning in El Paso. He had been fighting COVID for the past three weeks but finally lost that battle at 97 years of age. His name was James Hinde but his religious name was Peter and that's how most people knew him.

He and Mercy Sister Betty Campbell operated the Casa Tabor (Tabor House) on Buena Vista Street, San Antonio, before moving to Casa Tabor in Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. They lived in Juárez for over 20 years working in one of the most impoverished (and dangerous) colonias. Betty will continue to live there.

Mary and I used to visit them on Buena Vista St and had long conversations always about the oppressed and the people's resistance. They always welcomed with a pot of beans and rice anyone who stopped by. They had a vegetable garden in the back where they grew some of their food. They continued that admirable task in Ciudad Juárez.



Both fought many social justice battles here and everywhere they went including several trips to Central America. They stood proudly and bravely against the infamous U.S. School of the Americas (SOA) in Fort Benning, GA, where the U.S. army to this day trains assassins from armies throughout the world. They trained the ones who on March 24, 1980, killed Archbishop Oscar Romero and on November 16, 1989, killed six Jesuit priests, their assistant and her daughter in San Salvador.

Mary and I will always remember with much love and respect James (Peter) Hinde as a unique and caring human who was always a warrior for the world's downtrodden.

Please pass this information to others who knew Peter and Betty when they lived in San Antonio.
