January 6<sup>th</sup> is a date that will live in infamy in the U.S.A.—the day the U.S. capitol came under attack. January 6<sup>th</sup> is also *Three Kings' Day* when the three wise men arrive with gifts to honor the birth of Baby Jesus. Throughout Latin America and other countries, this date is celebrated as the principal holiday of the Christmas season with children receiving gifts.

This year, January 20<sup>th</sup> was the annual celebration of *Martin Luther King Jr. Day* coinciding with the inauguration of Trump's 2.0 presidency. Nothing in the celebratory inauguration nor in the days that immediately followed reflected the values of Martin Luther King, Jr. who believed in, above all else—non-violence, love, equality, peace and service to others. The Trump 2.0 presidency in its first week has reeked of vengeance, hate and retribution, not to mention white suprem-

acist ideology with executive orders being issued daily targeting huge groups of people starting with immigrants who face deportation, loss of birthright citizenship and loss of any right to enter the U.S. regardless of current status. The LGBTQ community face the erasure of transgender rights and gender non-conforming ideals with the president's declaration that the federal government will only recognize two sexes, male and female. People of color in federal jobs holding "DEI (diversity, equity, inclusion) positions" are now on paid leave with their jobs in jeopardy and the Spanish language has been wiped from the White House website. The list goes on and on.

However, the worst order from the new 2.0 president has been his pardon of 1500 January 6<sup>th</sup> perpetrators convicted of storming the Capitol in an effort to stop the certification of Joe Biden's 2020 election. In addition, the sentences of another 14 people were commuted, including leaders of the Capitol attack— who are also leaders of the far-right militant groups, the *Oath Keepers* and the *Proud Boys*. The release of all of these individuals without review of their violations will ultimately lead to more violence.

In this issue of *La Voz de Esperanza*, David Rodgers writes about the *Day of the Kings* and the newly celebrated *Day of the Oxen* that began on January 6, 2021—day of the Capitol insurrection. In Spanish, *Día de los reyes* X *Día de los bueyes* rhymes and the word *bueyes* has a variety of meanings in slang. Los bueyes are the cronies that align themselves with the newly elected 2.0 presidency, chief among those are the three cyberkings who sat with Trump during the inauguration: Musk, Zuckerberg, and Bezos now part of an oligarchy that will rule this nation. *Los bueyes* are oxen who in Spanish refers to castrated bulls and in slang refer to dumb or stupid individuals and other more crass innuendos. *Día de los bueyes* (according to the poem) now celebrates the Capitol attack along with the recent pardons as part of the celebration. Where that goes from here, we'll see—but, it does not bode well.

This month *La Voz* also includes poems by Maria Sabina, a celebrated shaman of Oaxaca in Mexico. Her poems are a reminder that there is more to life than greed, than A-I, than materialism. As we venture into a year of uncertainty, turmoil and hostility, we need to remain focused on loving kindness and our relationship to the natural world outside and let it speak to us and direct us in these turbulent times.
