Dear Voz Readers, I read a couple of entries on FB recently that esteemed elder, María Berriozábal, wrote that I thought worthy of sharing with you (with permission):

On these *times of resistance*, she wrote: It has been painful, worrisome and plain scary to learn what is being done to our democracy. So many people, particularly the most vulnerable are being hurt badly. We do not have to wait for something really horrible to happen when so many pillars of our democratic society are being destroyed. The terror is already here—These



were my thoughts as I was out taking in some sun. I was surprised by all the flowers on our *Mr. Lincoln Rosebush*—one Olga and Al Kauffman planted a couple of years ago. There were 18 roses!

The message I received was: "Look at this miracle and you did so little for it to happen. Just look!" The lovely roses made me think of the good in life: The love, respect and care people have for each other. The tenderness and innocence present in children. The dreams and beauty of youth. The unique cultures and histories we carry—gifts from our ancestors. The personal sacrifice and hard work of men and women who move communities ahead and give us inspiration. The power and beauty of our natural environment and the creatures that live with us. Friendship and love. Art! The marvelous present we have as humans to love and to be loved.

I stood and thought and then what I feel often, cut into the lofty place: ¿Oyes, que tienes, girl? Hey woman! NOT EVERYONE HAS THIS! I went back to the terror and the hate being spewed by so many. I was left realizing that only some people possess some of the treasures I listed: whatever it is that we have, represents our obligation to help those who suffer. The more we have—the greater the obligation. The roses were my reminder that it will be the good that is harvested from each of us that will be the energy needed to confront what is happening in our country. (March30)

Then right after *Easter Sunday*, the Pope dies and María kindly eulogizes him:

I am grieving the death of a leader of courage, a man who represented and spoke for social, economic and environmental justice. He gave us courage to tackle these issues. The first *Pope from the Americas* from the very start of his pontificate exuded humility in a rare and holy way. I recall on the night he was chosen to be the next pope he went to his window and asked us to pray for him. He came to be among us and not above us.
